Volunteer Stream Cleanup Program (VSCP) Annual Wrap Up

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MiCorps VSCP provides small grants to local units of government to help implement trash cleanup of rivers, streams, and creeks to improve the waters in Michigan. Local units of government are eligible to get the grants, and often partner with nonprofit organizations or other volunteer groups to carry out the cleanups.

\$25,000 is made available each year in VSCP grant funding. EGLE's appropriation for this program originates from fees collected from the sale of the state's Water Quality Protection license plates (2000 PA 74). Eligible organizations may apply for up to \$5,000 on their project. The grants require 25% local match of the total project cost. Grant funds are disbursed on a cost-reimbursement basis, and only disbursed after satisfactory completion of the cleanup project and final reporting requirements.

Seven eligible organization applied for and received funding in 2021: Benzie Conservation District, City of Ecorse, the Clinton County Conservation District, Genesee County Parks and Recreation Commission, Grand Traverse Conservation District, Missaukee Conservation District, and St. Joseph Conservation District. Each of the organizations completed fact sheets that summarize their project and are included in the next pages of this report.

In total, the seven organizations received \$15,509.57 (out of the \$25,000 available.). This means that \$9,490.43 went unspent, but it was MSU's and HRWC's first time managing the project with only a couple of months of lead time before the request for proposals went live. We anticipate more applications in 2022 since we have been talking about the project for a year now in various locales.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION:

The Benzie Conservation District (BCD) partnered with the Boardman River Clean Sweep and the Traverse Area Paddle Club to host river cleanups on the Platte and Betsie rivers in 2021. The first cleanup was on the Betsie River on June 12th. We hosted a total of 21 volunteers (and four staff) and cleaned three sections of river starting at the Homestead Dam and finishing at the River Road boat launch covering about 8 miles of river. This section of the Betsie is heavily fished during the fall salmon run and is full of fishing line and lures. These create a hazard for paddlers and wildlife alike. In total we cleaned over 100 lbs. of trash from the Bestie River. The BCD provided volunteers with breakfast and a boat wash before the cleanup. We also worked with the kind folks at the Betsie River Resort who let our upstream crew take out at their launch and use their dumpsters for river trash.

On July 17th we hosted 27 volunteers for the Upper Platte River Clean Sweep from US-31 at Veteran's Park down to Deadstream Road. We split the nine river miles into two sections. Again, boat washes were available for any paddlers who had been in another waterbody within the previous two weeks. We had a record number of volunteers for the Platte which was likely because we switched from our traditional day of the last Thursday in May to a Saturday in July. We cleared about 150 lbs. of trash from the Upper Platte River including a pop-up tent frame, numerous sandals, and bottles. We also found a dead duck that was hooked on a fishing lure dangling from an overhanging branch. After the cleanup we grilled brats and enjoyed lunch in the Honor Park.

Between the two clean sweeps we had a total of 48 volunteers and cleaned out 250 pounds of trash from our beautiful waterways!

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION:

Successes: The Ecorse Creek Committee had a busy summer hosting three litter clean ups, in three cities, along Ecorse Creek. Collectively, 126 volunteers from all over Southeast Michigan joined together to remove over 2,398 pounds of litter from the creek! The Committee is thrilled with this year's results and are already planning for even bigger events in spring and summer 2022. Thank you to all the volunteers who supported the clean-up efforts, including Ecorse's Department of Public Works. Their heavy equipment made quick work of equipment cleaning.

Challenges and Lessons Learned: Our challenge is always to get more people from the shoreline, into boats, and onto the the water. Due to COVID, some of our trusted partners were no longer interested in renting kayaks for these types of events. Thankfully we found another partner and we able to supply additional kayaks, and a few canoes to serve as barges, for our September clean up. They were very well received. Our main lesson learned is to begin outreach and advertising MUCH earlier in the year to ensure people have the clean up dates on their calendars.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION:

The Clinton Conservation District partnered with the Friends of the Looking Glass to host a river cleanup in Dewitt at Riverside Park to provide water quality education and increase awareness of water recreation opportunities on the Looking Glass River. Local groups such as Friends of the Maple River, Tri-County Regional Planning Commission, and the Clinton County Parks and Greenspace Commission helped promote this event. Support from Dewitt Township allowed us to use the park space free of charge. The Mid-Michigan District Health Department also assisted by providing water sampling for *E. Coli* levels at local road stream crossings.

The Friends of the Looking Glass (FOLG) has a newer board of directors that are passionate about paddling and increasing engagement along the Looking Glass River corridor in Clinton County. The river, with some regular maintenance, is a very easy float for canoers and kayakers alike. The FOLG actively recruits membership for their organization in light of increasing community interest in the river for recreation over the past couple years. Our collaboration with the FOLG focused on the most urban 3.5 mile stretch of the river – a section with the most put-ins compared to any other section. However, the FOLG held two additional cleanups in June and September which resulted in 15 miles of cleaned river total over the three events. Our greatest challenge during event planning was the gaps in communication between organizers. This challenge emerged when our original event, planned for July, was rescheduled due to flooding. Unfortunately, the rescheduled event was coordinated with another organization without our knowing. Going forward, we have learned that clear communication and setting explicit guidlelines for our program partners is an essential piece of organizing a river clean up event.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION:

The Genesee County Parks partnered with the Flint River Watershed Coalition to host stream cleanups along the Flint River in Flint, Michigan. This program is celebrating the amount of larger objects in the river that the cleanup crew were able to retrieve in spite of the water conditions. These objects posed a threat to both the health of the Flint River and the health and safety of those who use the Flint River for recreation. Large items like car doors and bumpers, large furniture pieces, pieces of sheet metal, and metal poles were removed during periods when the river was safely accessible, along with dozens of trash bags of litter like cups, bottles, debris from fishing, and other trash.

Due to unseasonalby high water all season, averaging several feet above normal levels, cleanups along Dort Highway were not attempted. Water level checks were performed, but it was decided that it was unsafe to pull tires this season. Cleanups occured along the Flint River through Chevy Commons when the water levels were low enough to permit access, and these cleanups covered a route of 3.25 miles that was revisited 4 times over the summer by our cleanup crews.

Normally, cleanups are performed by walking through Chevy Commons pulling kayaks and a flat bottomed boat behind us with tethers until we hit deeper water at the entrance to Mott Park. Due to the high water that method was not feasible most of the summer, and the fast water added a degree of difficulty at pulling trash out of strainers, which are downed trees that pose a hazard to recreational kayakers. But our team adapted, and was able to pull a large amount of trash from this stretch of the river, including an entire muffler system and a floating pound of butter.



PROGRAM DESCRIPTION:

Due to Covid-19, this year's Boardman River Clean Sweep event was not done in one day but in 5 days. The first clean-up event In partnership with Boardman River CleanSweep founder Dr. Norm Fred, took place on May 15th when a group from Back Country Hunters and Anglers asked if they could help. The group conducted a clean-up of the downtown section. The 5 sections in the upper part of the Boardman were cleaned over the course of 3 days...June 6, 14, & 16. It was much easier to break the clean-up down over a three day period which resulted in fewer people to shuttle and less chance of a Covid infection spreader event

During the June events in the upper river, one of our crews found and photographed 5 pieces of large flood debris in the Shumsky to Beitner section. On July 21, we took 7 canoes and 9 people to take out these sunken docks. The size and weight of the debris required us to leave some of the debris on the shore out of the flood plain for later retrieval. The locations were marked with GPS coordinates.

The September event for a 2nd downtown cleanup was canceled due to the Covid Delta surge.

Success: We were afraid this year would be a total loss but it turned out so much better than we had imagined. With some careful planning, we were able to safely do more projects than we thought possible back in March and April. We also gained a new group in the Back Country Hunters and Anglers that pledged to come back nex year. **Challenge:** COVID-19 Delta Variant. **Lessons Learned**: We did have a mishap on the large debris project day where a volunteer took off his PFD and then flipped in a strong current. It was scary and a close call but he came up in a few very long seconds with a few scratches on his legs. I think he learned his lesson and so did the rest of us. We will tell his story to others as a reminder of the value of a PFD while paddling and working on the river.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION:

There were several challenges of this project. We had started out being sensitive to the Covid-19 pandemic, not being sure if groups would be able to gather, etc. and set out to have river clean-up kits distributed to White Birch Campground and Canoe Rental LLC who would distribute river cleanup kits to paddlers using his services. Mr. Howard, the owner, agreed to gather and weigh trash that was removed from the river and record it.

Problems ensued when orders were placed for the items to be included in the river clean up kits – there were delays, unavailable products, and unreachable vendors.

The kits were assembled with products received by a team of volunteers from the Lake City Women's Club on 7/30/21. Information on the Muskegon River Watershed Assembly Trash Bash and Michigan Paddle Stewards was included. Kits were dropped off August 3. Promotions were made on Facebook and Instagram and in area retail stores. Kits were kept in our office for those who were headed to a different part of the river.

We expanded to Smithville Landing, Big Manistee River, in Kalkaska County. The owners also agreed to distribute clean-up bags and weigh the trash removed and dropped off the kits August 12. 2 the Moon Bakery had a river trip as a reward for their employees, as noticed on Facebook by Missaukee CD staff, so they were contacted and received bags. A 13# trash bag was filled! Smithville Landing stated they had 4 groups that utilized the bags and covered 12 miles each for a total of 48 miles; amount of trash removed wasn't known.

While this year's results were poor, we know our numbers will shoot up by mid-summer 2022.



PROGRAM DESCRIPTION:

This year we successfully cleaned 5 different stretches of the river. We removed a good amount of trash from the rivers including several tires, a washing machine, barrel, shoes, cans, wrappers, styrafoam ect.. the majority of the challenges we faced were weather related. Our second scheduled cleanup for June 19th had to be canceled the morning of the cleanup due to inclimate weather, a challenge was selecting a date to reschedule that worked with all parties involved as it was supposed to be a public cleanup including a group of boyscouts. Something I would do differently would be to plan backup dates ahead of time as a failsafe plan if the original date has to be postponed. Aside from the setbacks of weather causing a lower number of volunteers we had a successful turnout for the rest of the dates.

Next year I will do more to promote the cleanups through social media and more newspaper articles to encourage a larger turnout of volunteers and to get the idea and promotion of keeping our rivers clean out there. I am very gratefull for this opportunity and plan to keep improving the program.
